Our Vision: Samaritan Village is a private, non-profit organization established and run by volunteers to develop, expand and maintain a Christian orphanage to care for abandoned and orphaned children.

Our Goal: We work to reduce the number of abandoned children and the deaths of children in Tanzania by providing care for those whose parents have either died or abandoned them and who have no relatives responsible for their care. This is accomplished by providing a safe and stable Christian home environment where children are provided food, shelter, clothing, education and medical care.



As with most non-profit organizations, fundraising activities have ground to a halt due to the current pandemic. In addition, donations are down as people face the difficulty of losing a job or even an entire business. It's no different for Samaritan Village. Things Get Back to Normal for the Children

Josephat wrote to let us know things in Tanzania have returned to normal, although they are still using extra precautions to guard against Covid19. All the children are now back in school, including those who go away to boarding school. However, there are definitely some problems that remain for both the country and the orphanage.

As most of you may have read in the *Letter* we sent last month, outsiders haven't been allowed at the orphanage for the past several months. Members of the local community help out tremendously through their generous donations of both money and supplies for the children. Foreign visitors contribute a great deal as well. All that ended abruptly and has yet to resume.

While we are financially stable at this time, other orphanages are not as fortunate. Josephat tells us that a number of children's homes have been forced to close their doors due to a lack of funds. The children from those orphanages are now being distributed to other local orphanages.

In addition, many more families are abandoning their children for various reasons. We received four new children within two weeks of opening back up. (You can read about them on the next page.) Sadly, we expect to be seeing even more children in the near future.

Lisa is approximately two years old. She was found after being abandoned the first week of July. She had been left alone in the slums of the area in Arusha known as Unga Ltd. She looks healthy and, as you can see from her picture, she is a very happy, outgoing little girl. She was brought to Samaritan Village on July 7th. She would love a sponsor!



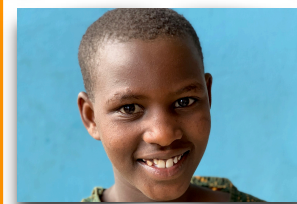
Jessica and Josephine

Around the same time Lisa was found, two little twin babies were also found. They had been abandoned in the same area and were found alone and crying at 3:00 a.m. They were turned over to the police, then to social welfare and finally brought to the orphanage. The girls are doing well, especially once they were each given a pacifier. Josephat named them Jessica and Josephine. They would each love a sponsor!



Deborah

(This is graphic) Josephat admitted a baby girl who was found on July 13th. The baby was found soon after delivery. She was dumped in the waste bin with the placenta still attached. The baby stayed in the hospital for four days and came to Samaritan Village on July 17th. She was given the name Deborah. She looks healthy. She would love a sponsor!



Neema (January 3, 2008)

Neema is one of ten Maasai girls brought to Samaritan Village when the "orphanage" where they were living was closed by the government. Theirs is a tragic story—too sad to publish here in its entirety. The girls had been taken from their tribe by a group claiming to be part of a legitimate orphanage. They said they were "rescuing" them from becoming child brides (and one of many wives) to an older Maasai man. Although they were "rescued" from that future, they were brought into an even more horrific situation.

Without going into detail, one of the girl's escaped from the "orphanage" where they were being exploited and was able to tell authorities what was happening to them. The girls were immediately rescued and taken to Samaritan Village. Those involved were tried and given various sentences including one man being sentenced to life in prison.) Today the girls are flourishing in their new home!

We can have **all** the children sponsored if we **all** just give a little. Each child growing up at Samaritan Village would love a sponsor. The children shown here are the **only** children at the orphanage without a sponsor. **Why not sponsor one of them today for as little as \$20/month?**



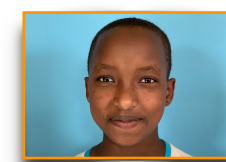

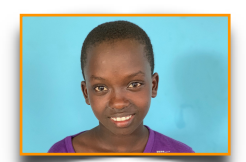
